JODO SHINSHU, Teaching of Pure Land "Amida Buddha's Vow #7 03/2022 Reverend Jeffrey Soga, resident minister

Gradually, sun rises earlier, sun sets later, and sun light is getting warmer. How are you living every day? The Corona pandemic still continues. I hear a news that Russian troops may invades Ukraine. I wish no war. Why do people use precious tax money to make weapons and use them to destroy historical buildings, hurting and killing each other. I assume it's not easy, but they should try to talk, understand, compromise, find harmony, and then they can finish this conflict and soldiers can go home peacefully.

On this issue, I'd like to write here about Amida Buddha's Vow through a war. The sutra describes 48 yows of Amida Buddha. The first yow writes:

If, when I attain Buddhahood, there should be hell, the realm of hungry spirits, or the realm of animals in my land, may I not attain the perfect enlightenment.

Amida Buddha vows there is no JIGOKU (hell), GAKI (hungry spirit) and CHIKUSHO (beast or animal) in my (Pure) Land.

Master Genshin (942 - 1017) wrote about detailed JIGOKU in his book. I'd like to write brief sentence.

At first there is TOHKATSU JIGOKU (hell of living equally and continuously). People in this hell have an aggressive and hurting mind. If people who don't know each other and should encounter each other for the first time, they start fighting. Because people in the hell have a nail which is very sharp like a knife, when they grab each other, meat is cut, fresh and blood were scattered, and after that nothing but bones were left over. (omission) After the fighting, cool wind blows over the bones, the body was heeled and continue fighting and suffering.

It is kind of gross, however, after the war and battle, it could be happened. One individual soldiers don't have any hate and reason, without any reason, they encounter incidentally, they start to fight each other. If the soldier could kill enemy and survive, he/she must live with the awful memories for his/her whole life.

A deep scar remains in the heart. If you do as such, it is the same as creating such realm of hell, hungry ghost.

I believe Amida Buddha observes such realm, or our human being's spiritual lives, Amida Buddha vowed, as the first vow, in my Pure Land there is no such realm.

PRESIDENT'S MESSGE Evan Watarida, President of Waipahu Hongwanji

Aloha everyone,

Recently in February, the 2022 Gisseikai Legislative Assembly in which all temples and ministers meet to approve matters for the upcoming year was held virtually. Here is a summary of the resolutions that passed during the assembly.

- 1) Honpa assessments to temples were reduced for 2022 which will aid temples (Waipahu included) that had reduced income during COVID.
- 2) A statewide annual endowment campaign was approved. Funds collected would be added to Honpa's capital fund investments. Interest earnings would support Honpa's budget and reduce the burden of ongoing temple assessments as it grows.
- 3) Funding for the new Ka Leo O Kahea newsletter was approved for the four quarters of 2022. If you are a member receiving the Waipahu Golden Chain, you should be receiving the Ka Leo O Kahea from Honpa as well. If you are not receiving it, please contact the temple.
- 4) Approval of a \$50K subsidy to Pacific Buddhist Academy that will be used for tuition assistance and enrollment growth.
- 5) Hilo Hongwanji is constructing a new \$4M preschool and Honpa will provide a \$1M credit line in case their \$4.5M of pledges come in slower than building costs.
- 6) Papaaloa Temple on the Big Island closed, and membership will merge with Honohina Temple

Looking ahead to 2023, travel packages are being made available for the joint 850th anniversary of Shinran Shonin's birth and the 800th anniversary of Jodo Shinshu in Kyoto, Japan. Special services will be held during May 2023, which will coincide with the BWA World Convention in Kyoto. For those that prefer to stay closer to home, special celebration activities are being planned for 2024 to commemorate the 135th anniversary of Honpa Hongwanji Hawaii. These events will be announced in the future.

Here at Waipahu, planning is currently proceeding on resumption of Obon, our bazaar, and other in-person temple activities this year as COVID cases and restrictions continue to decline. Details will be announced as we get nearer to those dates and we get better clarity on where guidelines are headed. Thank you to all our members and volunteers who continue to selflessly support our temple.

浄土真宗の教え 2022年3月 「阿弥陀様の願い その7」 駐在開教使 曾我大円

少しづつ朝日が早く、そして日没が遅くなり、太陽の日差しも強くなってきています。いかがお過ごしでしょうか。まだまだコロナは続いております。またロシアの軍隊がウクライナへ侵攻しているとニュースを聞きます。なぜお金を使って兵器を作り、見ず知らずの人たちが傷つけあい、命を取り合うのでしょうか。どうにか話し合いをして、もちろん難しいことなのかもしれませんが、譲り合いと協調で傷つけあうことなく終わるように願うばかりです。

今月は戦争ということから、阿弥陀様の願いを考えてみたいと思います。四十八通りある阿弥 陀様の願いの一番最初の願いは次のようにあります。

「原文」たとひ我仏を得たらんに、国に地獄、餓鬼、畜生あらば、正覚を取らじ

「意訳」もし、私が仏となることができる時、私の国に地獄、餓鬼、畜生という世界があった ならば、私は覚りをひらくことが出来ません。

私の国には地獄や餓鬼や畜生はないぞ、と願われたのです。

地獄とはなんでしょうか。源信という方が詳しく「往生要集」というご本の中に説明して下 さっています。その文章を少しだけ紹介させていただきます。

意訳を書かせていただきます。

初めに等活地獄(とうかつじごく)があります。この地獄の罪人はいつも人を傷つける心を抱いていて、もしたまたま出会うことがあれば、おのおの鉄の爪を持ってたがいに掴みかかって、ケンカを始めます。お互い傷つけあった後は、血も肉もボロボロになって、ただ骨が残るばかりです。(中略)その残骨の上を涼風きたりて吹き、体が元にもどって同じ苦しみを続けてゆかなけばなりません。

戦争は悲しいことですね。一人一人の戦士たちはお互いになんの恨みもなく、理由もないのに、たまたま出会ってしまったら、お互いが殺し合いを始めなければなりません。しかし、たまたま相手を殺して生き残ることが出来たとしても、その心の中には深い傷が残り、生涯その辛く苦しい思い出と共に生きてゆかなければなりません。

これは戦争に限ったことではありません。私たちの毎日の生活の中で欲の心を起こし、腹をたて、愚痴を言い、お互いにその心から発する言葉が鋭い刃のようになってお互いが傷つけあい、一緒に苦しみ、心の中に深い傷を残していくような生き方をされておられませんか?その姿こそ阿弥陀様が見られた私たち人間の世界であり、そのような世界は決して阿弥陀様の願われる世界には無い、と、先ず最初の願いをそこに建てられたのです。

若い戦士たちには私たちと同じように父があり、母があり、妻や夫があり、子供があり、友達があり、その皆が無事に帰ってきてくれることを願っておられることでしょう。阿弥陀様の願いをお聞かせいただく時、同じように、戦士の一人一人が傷つけあうことなく、家族の待つ所へ無事に帰られることを願うばかりです。
