This month, May 21, will be a birthday for Shinran Shonin, a founder of Hongwanji. He will be 849 years old. Hongwanji in Kyoto, Japan, our mother temple, will celebrate 850 years birthday next year.

These past three months, I wrote a somewhat heavy story, about hell. Therefore, I'd like to write a bright thing this month. I'd like to share about Amida Buddha's 3rd Vow.

"If, when I attain Buddhahood, the humans and devas in my land should not all be the color of genuine gold, may I not attain the perfect enlightenment."

My understanding is that:

Amida wishes that if we were born into Amida's pure land, we would all be golden Buddhas. Next time you visit Waipahu Hongwanji Temple, please look at the altar. Amida and his surroundings are a shining gold color. When I look up at the altar, I remember Amida's third Vow.

Amida is hoping that everyone will be all sparkly. Do you live a glittering life? Amida Buddha is wishing all of us have a shining life. Are you living everyday with a shining, fulfilled, meaningful life?

In the world where we live, men and women all have different faces, speak various words, and various people live together. Some people like natto, some people don't like it, some people like sweets, people who prefer salty things, some people are hot and cold, and all those people live together. That's why it's a wonderful world if everyone likes each other, respects each other, and lives together to pray for each other's treatment. However, it does not come as thought so. As the phrase "harassment" these days suggests, such as gender discrimination, racism, and religious differences, the person who is hurting is not aware of the heartache of the person who is hurting and distinguishes it from the good, bad, or useless person by their own measures. It can't stay away from suffering, anxiety, sadness and pain no matter how far it goes.

In-Person Caregiver Education and Support Group Returns By Maria Morales, CGSG Coordinator

More than two years have passed since the pandemic started. Project Dana's "Caring for the Caregiver" Support Group (CGSG) program continued to support family caregivers in our community by transitioning delivery of services virtually, online, and over the phone. Caregivers received education on various topics related to caregiving and aging by joining group meetings online through Zoom. Meanwhile, caregivers that needed counseling support and caregiver training received services over the phone or met with staff through Zoom.

The emotional, psychological, and physical burdens from caregiving are exacerbated by social isolation and loss of formal and informal support. With the updated mandates from the State of Hawai'i, businesses restarted operations and permitted group gathering outdoors. Project Dana arranged outings to give caregivers opportunities to socialize safely with their peers. For example, participants in the program enjoyed a walk through a botanical garden, visits at the Zoo, and drive-in holiday gatherings.

Project Dana is especially grateful we were able to continually support family caregivers through this pandemic. However, the Project also recognizes that there are limitations to virtual and remote delivery of services. Caregivers who lacked technology and capability to access services through these methods were at higher risk to stress and burden.

With information and knowledge to guide us in preventing the spread of Covid-19, Project Dana is returning in-person caregiver group meetings and counseling services. Meetings every second Saturday of the month from 9:30 am to 12:00 pm will return at Waipahu Hongwanji Buddhist Temple. The first meeting is May 14, 2022. Join us! Learn about "Health Management Strategies and Advocating for your Loved One" from our speaker Joni Kamiya, OT. 浄土真宗の教え 2022年4月 「阿弥陀様の願い その 9」 駐在開教使 曾我大円

5月となります。5月21日は親鸞聖人のお誕生日です。今年で849歳になられます。来年は850歳のお誕生日のお祝いが京都本願寺でお勤めされます。おめでたく有り難いことです。

今年に入って地獄の重い話が続きましたので、今月は明るい話を書きます。阿弥陀様の三番 目の願いには次のようにあります。

設我得仏 国中人天 不悉真金色者 不取正覚

たとひ 我仏を得たらんに 国中の人天 ことごとく真金色ならずは 正覚を取らじ (意訳)私が仏と成るとき 私の国の人たちが皆金色に輝かなければ 私には覚りをひらけません。

阿弥陀様のお浄土に生まれたならば、私たちは皆金色に輝く仏様にならせていただくのだよ、と阿弥陀様は願って下さっています。今度ワイパフ本願寺にお参りされる時、仏様のお姿をみて下さい。阿弥陀様とその周りは金色にキラキラ輝いています。このお姿を見上げる時、この阿弥陀様の三番目の願いを思いだすのです。

阿弥陀様は「皆キラキラするんだよ」と願っていてくださるのです。皆さんはキラキラ輝く 人生を生きておられますか。

私たちが生きている世界は、男とか女とか、みんな違う顔をして、いろんな言葉を話して、さまざまな人が一緒に暮らしています。納豆が好きな人もいれば嫌いな人もいる、甘いものが好きな人もいれば塩辛い方がいいという人、暑がりな人もいれば寒がりの人がいる、そんな人たちが皆一緒に生きているのです。だからこそ、そんな人たちが皆理解し合い、それぞれがそれぞれを敬い、共に譲り合ってお互いの仕合わせを願って生きていければ素晴らしい世界なのです。だけどそう思うようには参りません。未だに男女差別、人種差別、宗教の違いなど、最近流行りのハラスメントという言葉が示すように、傷つけている人は傷つけられている人の心の痛みを知らず、自分の物差しで良い人、悪い人、または役に立つ人、立たない人と分別しているのです。それはどこまで行っても苦しみ、不安、悲しみ、痛みから離れることはできません。

キラキラ輝くとはどういうことでしょう。この阿弥陀様の三番目の願いは、私たちが阿弥陀様の願われたお浄土にゆくことが出来たならば、皆がお互いを認め合い、讃えあう世界、ということです。いろんな人がいて、いろんな考えがあり、いろんな生き方があり、それが自分に都合の悪いことがあるかも知れません。しかし、それをお互い理解し、認めあっていくことのできる、そんな素晴らしい世界があるのです。皆が一緒にキラキラ輝く世界が願われてあるのです。

多分、阿弥陀様はご修行中に、人々が良し悪しを分別し、その人の価値観で人を差別し、傷つけ、苦しめる、そんな人や世界を沢山見られたのでしょうね。そして私の世界に来たるものは、全て金色に輝き、お互いが讃えあうことの出来る、そんな覚りの世界にすると成就してくださっているのです。そのことを思いながらお念仏させていただいております。 合 掌
